Grants Available to Change, Expand, Improve Farming Operations

Tennessee's farmers have the opportunity to receive cost share grants through the Tennessee Agricultural Growth Initiative. The goal of the grants is to help farmers change, expand, or improve their operations through production of diversified agricultural products that include agritourism, aquaculture, bees, flowers, fruits, horticulture, goats, organics, value-added products, vegetables, viticulture, and others as approved by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture.

The initiative is funded through a \$5 million appropriation for farm programs in this year's state budget as proposed by Governor Phil Bredesen and supported by the Tennessee General Assembly. Farmers can now apply for reimbursement of 35 percent cost share for activities or items within several funding categories. "These are substantial grants," said Tennessee Commissioner of Agriculture Ken Givens. "We want Tennessee farmers to know we mean business when we say we want to help them do business for a long time into the future."

Applications are now available through the Tennessee Department of Agriculture Market Development office and may be downloaded and printed from the department's Web site, www.picktnproducts.org. The application must be completed and mailed to the department by the application deadline. Kevin Cason holds the first Century Farm internship at the Center for Historic Preservation. The internship is funded jointly by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, through the Ag Tag program, and the CHP. Kevin, whose hometown is Tullahoma, received his bachelor of arts in history from Belmont University. He is a recent graduate of MTSU with a master of arts in public history. While studying for the M. A., he worked at the Rutherford County Archives. Kevin is pursuing a Ph.D. in public history at MTSU, and his particular interests are in American cultural history and state and local history. Kevin's primary work is related to preparing farm entries for the Century Farms Web site, but he will spend some of his year-long internship working with the staff of the Oscar Farris Agricultural Museum.

For the past year, Erin Lobb has worked with the Century Farms program processing files, managing the photographic collection, and assisting with planning for the Web site. Erin is a second-year graduate student in MTSU's clinical psychology program and holds a B.A. in psychology from the University of Mississippi. A native of Jackson, Mississippi, Erin is interested in behavioral treatments of childhood developmental disabilities, specifically autism. Erin will continue to work with the CHP through the spring of 2006 on various projects including Century Farms and the Iron Furnace Trail.

Two New Publications Available for Farmers

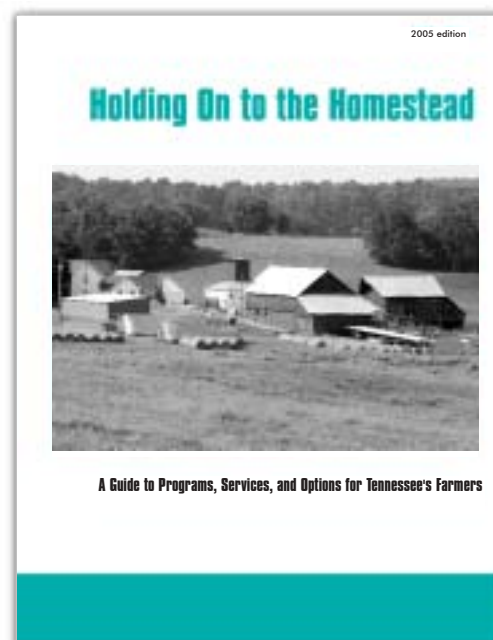
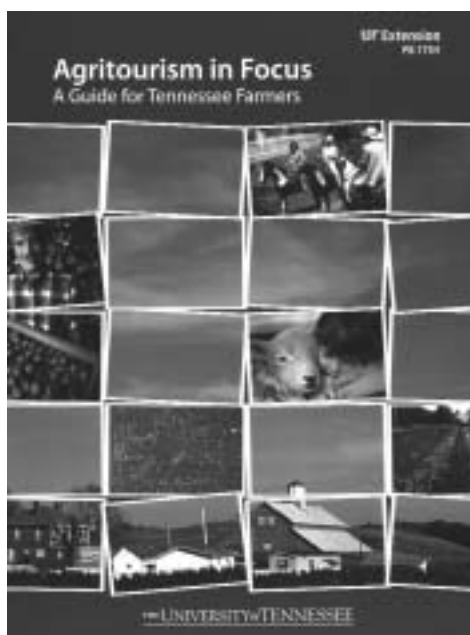
Agritourism in Focus: A Guide for Tennessee Farmers

is intended to help farmers and agritourism operators evaluate agritourism opportunities, plan agritourism enterprises, and resolve business-related issues and obstacles. Developed and released by the University of Tennessee Center for Profitable Agriculture, the publication includes topics such as business and market planning, customer service, risk management, safety considerations, and regulations. Agritourism operations range from cut-your-own Christmas tree and pick-your-own fruit farms to corn mazes, pumpkin patches, and on-farm retail markets for farm-fresh produce or products such as jellies, baked goods, and wines. This publication is one of the efforts of the Tennessee Agritourism Initiative which includes the Tennessee Departments of Agriculture, Tourist Development, and Economic and Community Development; the Tennessee

Farm Bureau Federation; and U.T. Extension, including the Center for Profitable Agriculture. The publication is available free of charge from local U.T. Extension offices or online at <http://cpa.utk.edu>.
