Tennesse Farmland Legacy Conference

Mark your calendar now for November 11 and 12, 2010, and plan to attend the Tennessee Farmland Legacy Conference, "Planning Today for Tomorrow's Farms," at the Music Road Hotel and Convention Center in Pigeon Forge. The conference will provide information on how farmers can improve their profitability and plan for their farm's future. Farm owners, community planners, and officials are encouraged to attend to learn about and discuss successful tools that preserve farmland while allowing measured and smart growth. Dr. Ron Hanson, back by popular demand from the 2008 conference, will discuss planning for your farm's transfer from one generation to another.

Century Farmers who participate in quilt trails, including the Appalachian Quilt Trail, will be the special honorees at a luncheon on Friday the 12th. Combining traditional farming practices with agritourism and heritage tourism, these farm families support the quilt trails that wind through several counties. Special guest speaker for the luncheon will be Blythe Semmer of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation in Washington, D.C. Ms. Semmer's family farm is the McMahan Century Farm, founded in 1850 in Sevier County.

Century Farmers Honored at Special Events

Each year, more counties are recognizing their Century Farm families at special events. Several county and regional fairs are now hosting these events as part of their annual schedules. This year, the Tennessee Department of Agriculture is offering reimbursement grants to 18 county fairs that applied for assistance to recognize local Century Farmers. Check with your county fair board to see when they are honoring Century Farm owners. If this is not yet part of your county fair or other annual agricultural event, suggest that Century Farms recognition be a part of the planning for next year.

FYI!

Of the 1,322 certified Century Farms, 595 are over 100 years old, 594 are over 150 years old, and 133 have been in the same family for more than 200 years. Of those farms that are 200 years or older, 48 are Pioneer Century Farms, a special designation for farms that were founded before or in 1796 when Tennessee became a state. Several farms are added to the rolls each month, and farms founded in 1910 are now eligible.


