Events Honor Century Farm Families

The number of special events, including county and regional fairs, that honor Century Farm families increases each year. Fair boards are among those that make an effort to include Century Farm events in their annual calendars. In 2011, nineteen (19) fair boards are taking advantage of a \$500 reimbursable grant, provided by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, Market Development Division, to support specific events associated with recognizing Century Farmers.

Other county and regional fairs, soil conservation districts, and county extension offices, along with museums and heritage groups, also take the time each year to honor newly certified farms and those that have already become part of the program. In June, the Land Trust for Tennessee, in cooperation with Brown-Forman and Jack Daniel's, sponsored a dinner for middle Tennessee Century Farmers and other farm families in Lynchburg. A similar event took place for southeast Tennessee farm families in late June at the Mayfield Dairy, a Century Farm that is, in part, protected with a conservation easement through the Land Trust for Tennessee. Recognition of the contributions of farmers to the economy, history, and culture of the state also encourages other eligible families to complete Century Farm applications.



The Land Trust for Tennessee and Jack Daniel's brought together Century Farmers from several counties in Lynchburg on June 3. About 170 farmers, Land Trust staff, and other guests enjoyed the evening of music, food, visiting, and information. 
