Tennessee Future Farmers of America Archival Project

Across Tennessee, many Century Farm families have generations of association with Future Farmers of America (FFA) county chapters as well as the state and national organization.

The organization had its origins in 1917 when Congress passed the Smith-Hughes Vocational Education Act. The act not only provided funds to states for high school courses in vocational education but also led to the organization of the National Future Farmers of America. On November 20, 1928, representatives attending the National Vocational Agricultural Students from 18 states met in Kansas City and formed the Future Farmers of America organization. Since that time, the FFA has been an important leadership organization that helps prepare students for successful careers in agricultural-related fields.

Since July 2011, the Center for Historic Preservation at Middle Tennessee State University has served as a partner in preserving the historic records of the Tennessee FFA. The project is coordinated by Dr. Kevin Cason, who has a Ph.D. in public history from MTSU. Kevin was the Century Farms intern at the Center for Historic Preservation during the time he was working on his doctorate, and he is largely responsible for creating the Century Farms website.

Under the leadership of the FFA Association and the Tennessee FFA Historic Preservation Project Steering Committee, Cason has organized the growing Tennessee FFA collection and rehoused the items into acid-free boxes, sleeves, and folders.



The FFA archival collection has many pamphlets and flyers that detail the history of the organization.

Kevin has filled 52 archivally safe boxes and 6 flat storage cases. In addition, scrapbooks, photos, and other materials have been scanned and digital copies made of items that are on temporary loan. Cason works on the archival project at the Coffee County Farm Bureau. The work space was graciously donated by Mark McBride, agency manager and former FFA state president.

The connection of FFA and the Tennessee Century Farms program is a close one because many Century Farm families are FFA alumni and current members. One example of this connection is Joe Moore, owner of the Carverdale Century Farm in Jackson County. Joe served as state president of the Tennessee FFA Association from 1953 to 1954 and was awarded the

Century Farms Number over 1,500

In 2013, the Century Farms program celebrates thirty-eight (38) years of documenting farms that have been in the same family and in agricultural production for at least 100 years. Begun by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture in 1975, about 600 farms were in the initial group of certified properties. By 1984, when the administration of the program was transferred to the MTSU Center for Historic Preservation, the number had increased to about 700. *Tennessee Agriculture: A Century Farms Perspective*, by Carroll Van West, was jointly published by the Department of Agriculture and the center in 1986, and it included the history of 783 farms.

While some farms have been sold out of their original families over the years, others have been certified. Today, all 95 counties of Tennessee are represented by one or more Century Farms. With this newsletter, the program includes a total of

1,507 farms: 157 are 200 years old, 634 are 150 years old, and 716 have reached the century mark. The program looks forward to receiving applications from farms founded before or in 1913. Visit the website at www.tncenturyfarms.org to read the farm histories. We rely on farm owners to help keep the Century Farm records and information up to date, so please be in touch if changes need to be made to your farm's entry and file.

Cassandra Bennett, a Texas native, is the current graduate assistant at the Center for Historic Preservation, working with the Century Farms program. She is responsible for helping process applications and maintain the website. She received her B.A. in history from Stephen F. Austin State University in 2010 and moved to Murfreesboro in the fall of that year to begin work toward an M.A. in public history at MTSU. She is concentrating on historic preservation, particularly in small towns and rural areas. Her thesis is on Tennessee's smalltown movie theaters. This past summer, Cassandra interned in McKenzie, Tennessee (Carroll County), where she worked on an architectural survey of the downtown and drafted a preservation plan for the Park Theatre (1941).
